## News from Elsewhere

### Diocese of Glasgow and Galloway



The Very Rev Dr Gregor Duncan was elected the new bishop of Glasgow & Galloway on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> January.

Gregor Duncan is currently Rector of St Ninian's Church, Pollokshields and Dean of the Diocese of Glasgow & Galloway.

Dean Gregor Duncan is 59 and his interests include collecting records and CDs, cooking and entertaining, reading modern novels, travel and history books.

The Primus commented, "I am delighted to welcome Dean Gregor Duncan as the next Bishop of Glasgow and Galloway. He has faithfully served the Scottish Episcopal Church and the clergy and people of Glasgow and Galloway for many years. He is widely respected and admired for his faithful pastoral care and the strength of his spirituality. I am delighted that he has now been chosen by the Electoral Synod to serve as bishop of this Diocese."

A service of consecration and installation of the new Bishop will take place in St Mary's Episcopal Cathedral in Glasgow.

### A Unique Partnership

A unique partnership between the Scottish Episcopal Church, the Methodist Church in Scotland and the United Reformed Church, National Synod of Scotland was signed at a special service on Saturday 23 January by the Most Rev David Chillingworth, Bishop of St Andrews, Dunkeld & Dunblane and Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church; the Rev Lily Twist, Chair of the Methodist Church in Scotland and the Rev John Humphreys, Moderator of the United Reformed Church, National Synod of Scotland.

Specifically the parties are exploring together ways of:

'Being Church and serving God together;

'Increasing the confidence of our members to speak of God and faith in ways that make sense to others;

'Cooperating in teaching and learning about Jesus Christ, and our mission together;

'Cooperating on Church and Society issues, supporting community development and taking action together for justice, especially among the most deprived and poor in Scotland;

'Sharing in the provision and deployment of both lay and ordained ministries of all the people of God;

'Sharing our resources across Scotland to fulfil our shared Christian mission to spread the Gospel;

The parties shall also seek to widen their Ecumenical engagement within the Partnership and with other denominations.

## Fabric

Last month I reported of the problems that faced us when the contractors tried to put up a scaffold in the bell tower during the rot work. The steel beams holding up the bells and the floor in the tower were rusted and considered unsafe. Work was halted and a structural engineer consulted. We received the report from the Structural Engineer which indicates that the beams will have to be replaced. This is expensive work as the access is difficult. In addition Wise Property have indicated that there is more wet rot in the church.

As a result of this the Vestry has asked for a meeting with the Architect and the Diocesan Representatives and this will take place on 23<sup>rd</sup> February.

Meanwhile the work required in the Rectory is well underway. The staircase has been remodelled, the chimney removed, work on the roof begun and some of the new windows are in.

It is all beginning to look much better.

## From the Counting House

Your Finance Team are at present incredibly worried as there are too many beans coming out of our tins and not enough beans going in.

You will no doubt be aware that there are many problems with the fabric of our beloved HT Church Building and the Rectory which are having a major impact on our stretched resources.

Work has started on curing the wet rot (some of which had become dry rot) in the Church building and in particular the tower. During this it was discovered that the beams supporting the bells are unsafe and so work in the tower was stopped and access to the tower, including the sacristy is now forbidden. The wet rot work in the Lady Chapel is still in progress. During the work it was also discovered that we have more of a rot problem. The remedial work is believed to very expensive (lots of 10s of thousands of pounds). At the moment we have paid over £7,500 towards the cost of this work. This in effect means that our Appeal Fund is 'overdrawn' to the extent of £4,000 as these monies had to be paid out of our General Fund.

We have agreed with St Paul's, Rothesay the work required on the Rectory and this work has started. We have agreed to pay 2/3rds of the cost of the work, the total is £22,000. We expect the bills for all works to be paid before Easter. Rothesay have in addition, agreed to replace all the windows at a cost of about £14,000. We will pay our share of the windows off at £1,800 per annum for the next 5 years.

As you will see we have very significant commitments to God's buildings at the top of our hill. While we hope, as a result, of hard work by the Vestry to get grants towards some of this, we will still have to raise at least 50% of the church costs and our 2/3rds of the Rectory costs. So, are we up for it?

## The Wider Church

Presiding Bishop of the USA Katharine Jefferts Schori paid a poignant visit to Port-au-Prince on February 8 to survey with [Episcopal Diocese of Haiti](#) Bishop Jean Zaché Duracin the devastation wrought by the January 12 magnitude 7.0 earthquake.

After climbing over the ruins of the diocese's Cathédrale Sainte Trinité (Holy Trinity Cathedral), the presiding bishop turned to Duracin and said "You should skip Lent this year; you have already had your Good Friday."

"Yes, we can all sing Alleluias together," Duracin replied, according to the Rev. Lauren Stanley, who accompanied Jefferts Schori on her five-hour visit.

Pointing to some of the cathedral's 13 bells that were visible among the ruins and that appeared to be salvageable, Jefferts Schori said "they will ring again" and that the cathedral "will rise again," according to Stanley.


While at the cathedral, Jefferts Schori and Duracin said prayers at what the Haitian bishop is calling the diocese's "open-air cathedral," which consists of some plastic sheeting stretched over a frame of two-by-fours that shelters some pews rescued from the cathedral ruins.

The two bishops each prayed aloud with those who happened to be at the site. Some of the older women members of the cathedral were combing the ruins for pieces of the building's world-famous murals depicting biblical stories in Haitian motifs. The gathered congregation also sang "How Great Thou Art" in French, Stanley said.

The nativity of Jesus was part of the world-famous reredos fresco in the Episcopal Diocese of Haiti's Cathédrale Sainte Trinité (Holy Trinity Cathedral) in Port-au-Prince.

During the visit, Stanley said, Duracin asked her to "tell the world that physically the church is broken, but the church is still there in faith. Our faith is still strong."

She said the Bishop asked for the support of Episcopalians everywhere to help Haitians rebuild the structures of the church because that work "will have a positive impact on our faith. It will bring us courage, confidence and a good future."

"We are approaching Lent," Stanley quoted Duracin as saying. "I ask people to be with us in the desert so that on Easter, all of us in Haiti and all the Episcopal Church may sing together in joy: 'Alleluia, Alleluia, the Lord is risen indeed.'"

The trip was also meant for Jefferts Schori and Duracin to talk about the immediate and future directions of the diocese. The Presiding Bishop assured Duracin that the entire Episcopal Church stood with his diocese in prayer and support, and would continue to do so, according to Stanley.
