There is, of course, much more to being a church than the fabric of our building, important as that may be. Our church is the people who worship, who pray, who find God's presence with us. We are also continuing to work hard to extend the warm welcome that Holy Trinity offers to all.

We are, therefore, continuing to hold many excellent social and fundraising events. Our plan is to try and have one significant event each month. Watch the pew sheet and elsewhere in the magazine for details, but a series of concerts, dinners, sales and other activities will be on offer over the next few months. These will give us a

chance to spend time with friends, welcome new members and often to raise funds for the building appeal! The recent success of the coconut shy at Kirn gala was a heartening example of both fundraising and profile-raising for Holy Trinity!

We must also remember the spiritual aspects of life at Holy Trinity. There are many prayer needs in our local community as well as further afield in the world. If you know of any person or situation that needs prayer, please let me know and we will make sure that daily and Sunday prayer can be offered. I hope to help us further develop our life as a church of prayer over the next few months.

When did you first come to Holy Trinity?

Michaelmas falls at the end of September, as the autumn colours set well and truly in and the chilly fingers of the colder weather start to grip. The darker evenings might make us feel like turning our collars up as we hurry home, or turning the heating up in our cars as we rush around our daily business and back to our warm homes. It is all too easy to become inwardly focused at this time of year!

But the feast of Michaelmas – the feast of Michael and All Angels – encourages us to think differently, even as the evenings draw in and the nights become cold. We can celebrate Michaelmas in all sorts of ways – I have heard so much about the wonderful installation in the pier terminal on a previous year. Solemn celebrations, joyous masses, craft-filled activity can all be possible reactions to the account of Michael and All Angels, the biblical creatures that serve God, are not human and are shrouded in mystery.

Recently I received an e-mail from a friend of one of my children, a girl who now lives in Australia. She asked me for some ideas for a talk she had to give: Are there angels among us?

That is a very good question, of course. We rarely see the biblical creatures with six wings or monstrous heads that are actual depictions of angels. If we did, we would probably go and get our glasses prescription checked! But there are many stories of strangers who appear at times of need, help people, and then seem to melt away without a trace. Are these angels? That is another good question.

But, at this autumnal time of year, we can try and concentrate on opportunities to BE angels! Rather

than rushing by, or hiding in our warm cars, we can make the effort to look out for our neighbours, for those around us in our community. We can keep an eye out for elderly friends, making sure that they are managing in the darker evenings. We can contribute to homeless charities. We might be able to help others make it up the steep drive to our church, even when the leaves are piled high as the limes shed their summer finery! We can even just keep those in need around us in our prayers, praying that God will comfort and protect all God's children.

This Michaelmas, we can ask, 'Are there angels among us?' The answer might just be, 'Yes – and you're one of them!'

From the Counting House

We have had some more good news, our claim for the return of VAT on building work on the Church has been agreed. We will get more than £1400 back. Thank you Maureen for all the work you have put in, filling in huge forms and joining Andrew and I scabbling among old files on the floor to dig out the necessary paper work.

A meeting with St Paul's treasurer has been held and I think an improvement in the working of the financial side of our Linked Charge will result. A face to face meeting is worth 100 emails. I came back by bus from Rothesay, I think we are very fortunate in this part of Argyll in our bus service, and the drivers who operate them.

As you know it was said at the time of Andrew's appointment that the Augmentation would only last for three years. We think we have heard that all before each time a new priest arrives and we are still getting the aid a number of years later! I think the "high hied yins" mean it this time. After all, this money currently about £900 a month comes from some other Church's giving. Why should they slave away in the big city to support us who choose to live in a beautiful place. We must find a way of being more self supporting in the next three years. Our future at Holy Trinity with a full time stipendiary priest depends on it.

Fabric Report

As the Rector indicated in his letter, we have received sufficient funds from generous donations and grants to begin the tower work. We have asked the builders to begin work on the tower as soon as they can schedule this. The work will replace the steel beams, put up scaffolding, repair the valley gutter, eradicate the rot in the tower and reinstate the vestry.

As far as the remainder of work in the church is concerned, we were unsuccessful in our bid for Heritage Lottery funding on this occasion but will seek other grants and still hope to be able to work to restore the building to its former beauty. We also intend to apply again to the Heritage Lottery next year.

The Vestry met on the 18th August.

The Rector took us through the report he had produced for the Diocese and Province which sets out our mission and vision and our plans to be free from augmentation in around three years time.

We discussed the changes authorised by the Bishops to the 1982 Liturgy and agreed we would like to produce our own Holy Trinity Service Booklet for 1982.

At every Vestry Meeting we now have an item to discuss the Linked Charge, our dependent congregation of St. Martin's Tighnabruaich and links with other churches.

As is usual there was considerable discussion on Finance, Fabric and Fundraising.

We agreed to set up meetings of our Focus Groups to consider how we take forward our mission and vision. A small Publicity Group has been set up to look at all our leaflets and booklets to update where necessary and draft new ones as required.

The next meeting is Thursday 23rd September.
